The seminar also attempts to analyze the paradigm shifts in portrayal and representation of women in contemporary texts.

4. Description of the Event: The two day long National Seminar started with the inaugural ceremony followed by the auspicious lighting of the lamp where BaneshwarTalukdar, Principal i/cRangapara College, Dr. Randendra Mohan Deka, HoD, English and other dignitaries present participated. 

They are still exploited and treated as inferior beings in this ancient land of dreams and nightmares. Women in India are conditioned to be passive receptacle to male virility and potency. Simone De Beauvoir's remarks are worth quoting in this context:

"She is defined and differentiated with reference to man and not he with reference to her; she is the incidental, the inessential. He is the subject, he is the absolute, she is the other."

Shobha De has authored twelve books. Her works which generally start with the letter 'S' and she wrote her first novel- the bestselling Socialite Evenings in 1989 and she published Starry Nights in 1990. Her other works are Sisters (1992), Strange Obsession(1992), Sultry Days(1994), Snapshots(1995), Second Thoughts (1996), Uncertain Liaisons (Co-edited with Khushwant

Marriage and Marginalisation in Indian Context: A Study of Chitra Banerjee Divakaruni's Arranged Marriage

Abstract:

Marriage is a striking part of Indian festivity, being celebrated by taking resort to endless rituals and extensive decorations. Since the common tradition in India is the shift of the bride to the groom's place, the idea of feminine identity is closely associated with Indian matrimony. The post marriage appearance of an Indian lady is a thinkable factor which encompasses study of her physical and psychological condition. In most cases psychological change in female folk can be traced in this regard which owe much to the way she has been treated in her new place in the name of post matrimonial tradition. Manifestation of post marriage violence has been a dominant thematic concern in narratives since literature tends to spread values by throwing light on the preoccupations of the surrounding. Being specific to South Asian Fiction, it can be said that in various narratives emanating from the region, depiction of the plight of feminine is prevalent; physical harm along with psychological attack can be visibly found in such narratives. Chitra Banerjee Divakaruni, an acclaimed writer, born in Kolkata and at present settled in Houston, America is considerable in this regard, working on the status of women belonging to various regions i.e. Indian subcontinent and immigrating to exotic places. In her fictional work, Arranged Marriage, a collection of catchy short stories, Divakaruni presents how in Indian

context the social institution of marriage gives licence to a certain people to continue demands, domination and subsequent marginalisation on the female in the name of tradition. Inside the ramification of marriage how some female are placed in a state from which she has no other choice than either to act accordingly or to repulsively do things on her own. The paper seeks to analyse the manifestation of marriage as a marker of marginalisation on femininity in given Indian context; it also seeks to explore the nature of resistance on the part of Indian female by throwing light on their behaviour as perceived and depicted by Divakaruni in the short stories in Arranged Marriage.
